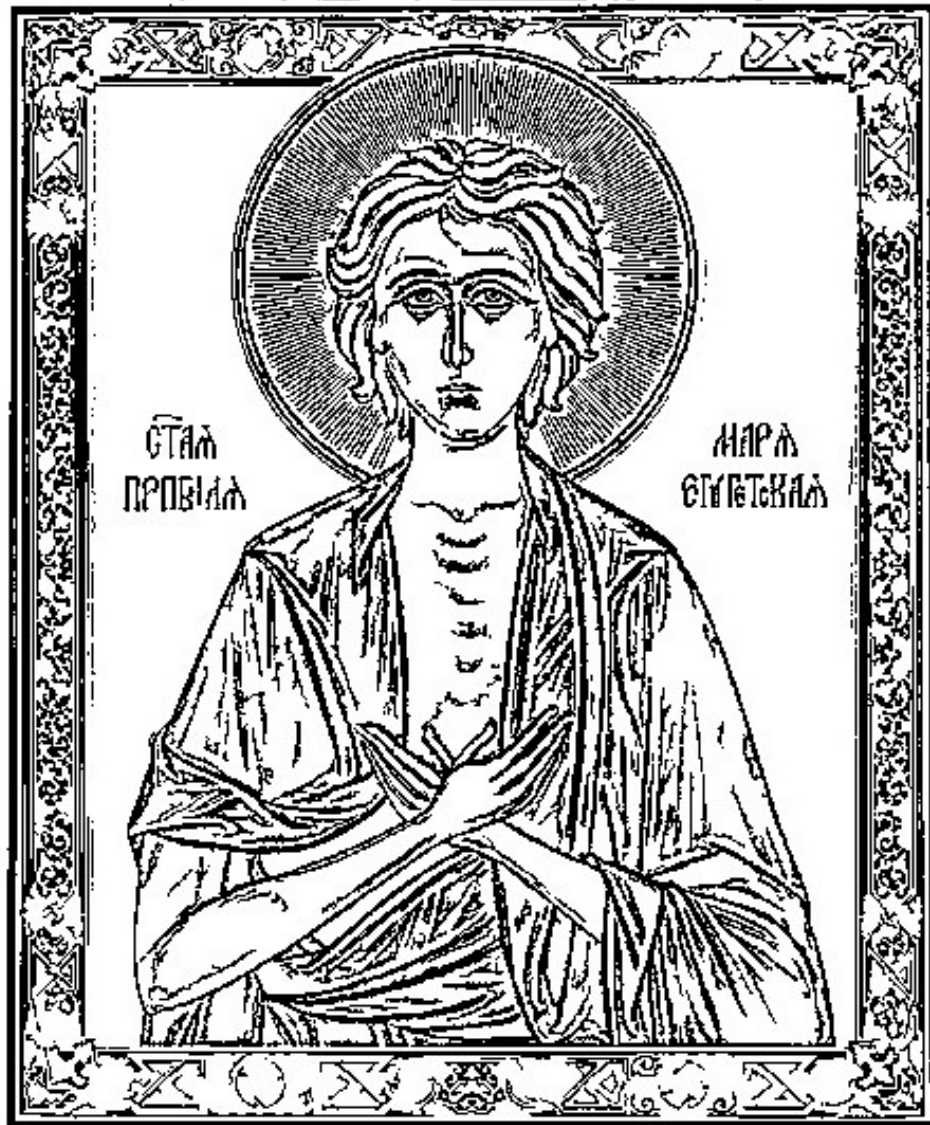

Have you ever tried really hard to be first in line? Have you even pushed people out of the way to get there? Even Jesus' disciples made that mistake once!

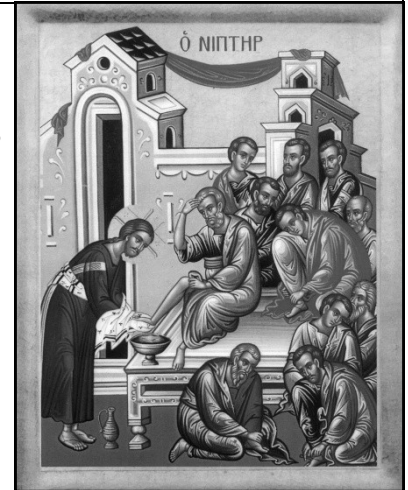
Today's Gospel reading tells us about two of Jesus' disciples, who wanted Jesus to give them a special place in his kingdom. They thought Christ was going to be some kind of king on earth, so they wanted to be close to the King!

After all, wouldn't it be nice to be served, like a king and his helpers? You wouldn't have to work so much. You could be entertained and fed and you certainly would never have to clean your room!

But Christ told them that even He, Jesus Christ, the King of all, "came not to be served, but to serve" (Mark 10:45).

If even our Lord, Jesus Christ came to serve, we should also try to serve too! That means looking out for other people first. That means thinking of ways you can help people with their needs. That means letting others have the special treatment that *we* actually want for ourselves.

Let's try to think of ways that we can *serve*—not *be served*...at home, at school, and all around us.

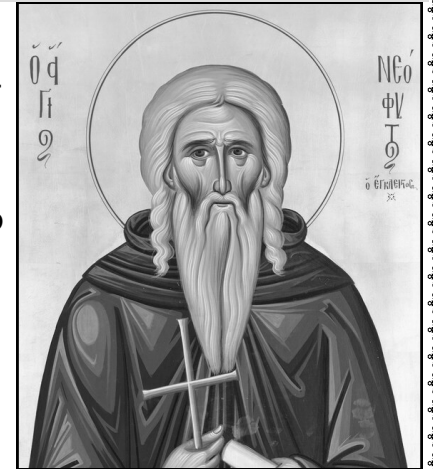

you're really good at? Maybe soccer or basketball? Maybe playing an instrument? Maybe cooking? Maybe math? Sometimes when we get good at something, we start to feel proud, and we start to think it's all because we're so great.



Saint Neophytos got to be really good at something too, but he always knew his gifts came from God. Saint Neophytos

grew up in Cyprus and his parents were poor farmers with 8 kids all together. Neophytos never went to school, and he did not learn to read and write as a kid.

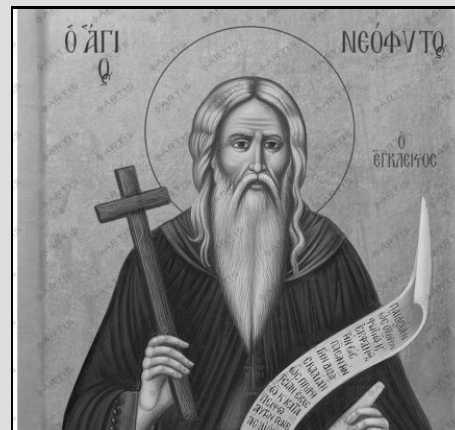
Later on, Neophytos really wanted to become a monk. He tried very hard to do this, and at last he got what he wanted. In the monastery, Neophytos finally started to learn to read and write. Neophytos began to live off by himself, away from the other people. That's why he is called a "Recluse" because he lived all alone. He got really good at prayer, talking to God.

St. Neophytos never went to school, but he got so good at writing that we still have more than a thousand pages that he wrote! He always knew his talent was a gift from God (just like ours are too). Saint Neophytos is a special saint of Cyprus, and he is a gift to them too!
